Words from Pastor Kari's Pen.

"For God is not a God of confusion but of peace." - 1 Corinthians 14:33

Is it just me, or have things felt uncommonly confusing these past few months?

For some reason even the smallest shift in a forever inconsistent schedule has often left me wondering "am I obtuse, or are things just getting harder?" It's either my friends. Though often it feels a bit of both are true.

In trying to keep up with all the activities, invitations, and the vast number of loved ones we can become confused as to what our original task is. The more things we try to understand or accomplish at the same time the harder it becomes to keep a clear eye on why we were called to engage and go forth in the first place. (Maybe this is why I never got a May newsletter out... my most sincere regrets to you all for that lapse in my role.)

So I found myself trying to find clarity.

Trying to get more sleep. Trying to take the right vitamins. Trying to be efficient and then give myself grace when I overextend or miss deadlines. Trying to be more present, plan ahead better. And all it did was make me more confused. Why are we doing all these things? How do they help us love God, ourselves, and our neighbors better?

When we follow the agendas of the world - no

matter how well intentioned they begin - we are influenced by the world. And the world does not often have your wellbeing or peace as the top priority. It leaves very little room for peace, or grace. And mercy is often nowhere to be found. If you follow the world's agenda, we will be crucified by our inability to survive this world's standards and demands. And far too often the ways we gauge success and efficacy in the world can not be applied to our discipleship or ministries. Which is beyond confusing for many.

We are not called to follow the agendas of our culture or our world. We are called to follow God's Word of Life - Scripture. When we dwell in scripture and follow God's call to love and serve, the confusing things fade away and the peace of Christ's unshakable love for you opens up a way of peace.

You can't be all the things for all the people. You can't be present for every event. You can't love yourselves as God loves you if you do not respect your own human boundaries (rest, respect, wellbeing). But we can find peace that God does not demand we be anything other than humble repentant creatures. Lambs of God's own flock that Christ cares for. People who do their best until they know better and repent of the old and begin again as redeemed children.

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It's confusing. Trying to keep up with the world. So, I pray this summer that we don't. Let's not do the rat race of following the world's itinerary for how we should live (over committed, burnout, cripplingly self-reliant). Let us live according to Christ's agenda. To be so closely linked to God that wherever our day leads us we may be bearers of God's peace. May we be so dependent on God's mercy and grace that no matter what we succeed at or what we fail at we may know Christ's peace around us.

I am not saying that we do not follow through on our callings to be good disciples in our various vocations and passions. But as you enter into the summer, if you find yourself confused, weighed down, overwhelmed, oppressed by the vastness of what lies before you... may these words bless you. God is not a God that "misspeaks". God does not speak in codes to confuse you and cause you to stumble. God loves you and provides words of life to sustain you through long hours. Strengthens you for the roads you are journeying on. And God's words never apologize for bringing hope to the hopeless, love to the outcasts, resurrection of the dead, and redemptions to sinners like us. How good it is to be loved so completely by a God who is never confused. No matter how confused we may be.

Be kind and good to yourselves and those around you. You have been blessed to be a blessing. And I thank God for you!

In April, our mission support to the synod was \$587. There was also a \$350 donation to ELCA World Hunger, \$300 for ELCA Disaster Response and \$140 was donated to the Jasper Co. Hunger Relief Team funds. Our mission support to the synod in May was \$1,094. There was also a \$350 donation to ELCA World Hunger, \$300 for ELCA Disaster Response and \$100 was donated to Lutheran Lakeside Camp.

Our monthly mission in April was for the Lutheran Chaplaincy Outreach, and there were \$370 in individual donations, resulting in a total of \$870 with our budgeted monthly mission funds.

The mission chosen for May was for our Youth Fund. There are plans for some of our youth to attend a mission trip to South Dakota this summer, and our Youth Fund will be supporting this trip. In May, there was a total donation of \$570. Given that this did not get widely shared in May, if you would still like to donate to this mission this month, please feel free to do so. Please write "Youth Fund" on your check or offering envelope.

June's monthly mission is Lutheran Services in Iowa's Migrant Worker Hunger Relief program. The goal of the program is to meet the needs of immigrant families for food during the short period when they are settled in a new place and have not yet started earning income from their work. Please consider asking your child or grandchild or niece or nephew or neighbor attend and have them invite a friend or two or three!!



Serve protein-packed waffles for a family breakfast on FATHER'S DAY or any special occasion.

What you need:

- Adult help
- Waffle maker
- Blender
- 1 cup old-fashioned oats
- 1 cup cottage cheese
- 6 eggs
- Cooking spray
- Diced strawberries
- Powdered sugar

What you do:

- 1. With adult help, preheat the waffle maker.
- In the blender, add oats and cottage cheese. Crack eggs in a separate bowl, then add to the blender. Pulse to combine the mixture. Then blend on medium speed for 10 seconds.
- Coat the waffle maker with cooking spray. Spoon about 1/3 cup batter onto the iron and close.
- 4. Carefully remove the waffle when it's golden brown. Repeat with remaining batter.
- Top with strawberries and powdered sugar. Makes about 6 waffles.

Our Father's arms

As a young boy, J. Ellsworth Kalas had to visit the Mayo Clinic for tests. His parents, knowing their son was safe in the hospital overnight, slept at a nearby hotel. But Kalas was so lonely and scared that a nurse called his folks. Kalas, who later became a pastor, recalled what it was like to have his father arrive.

"I remember his dressing me there in the darkness," he said. "Then I remember getting on a streetcar, sitting way at the back as we rode to the hotel. He held me very close to him, his long, ungainly arm wrapped around me. And the little boy who had been so frightened was now at peace."

We all face trials that can seem overwhelming. "How good, then, to draw deeply on the resources of God!" Kalas said. "In him there is a peace which is greater than the trouble. How good, indeed, to burrow into a place of security, and to feel an arm wrapping strong about us and to know that it is the arm of our heavenly Father."
